## Praying for those you love

Have you ever wondered how to pray for parents, children, friends, and pastors? Does it feel like you repeat the same things day after day and you are starting to sound like a worn out song stuck in constantly repeating loop? Here are seven things (one for each day of the week) that can be prayed for those you love and each can be expanded in a variety of ways.



**Pray for Hearts that are drawn into a love relationship with Christ.** Ask the Lord to deepen your loved one's appreciation for Jesus as the Son of God, fully human and fully divine. Ask that they have a greater awareness of the need for a Savior. Implore God to grow the desire to relate to Him in Christ. Ask the Lord to put a desire in them to pray and an earnest need to hear the voice of the Lord respond to their prayers. (see 2Cor. 13:14)

**Pray for a growing ability to discern the Voice of the Lord.** Ask God to sharpen the sense of discernment between our own inner voice, the voice of the world and the devil and the true voice of the Good Shepherd. Jesus says that, "My sheep listen to my voice; I know them and they follow me" (Jn. 10:27). Pray for a growing ability to hear God and a growing desire to make time in the busyness of life to be still and know that God is God. (see Hos. 14:9, 1Cor. 2:14, Phil. 1:10)

**Pray for a deep love of the Word of God to permeate all of life.** Closely tied to the ability to discern the voice of the Lord is an increasing love of the Word of God. Ask God to put within each of your loved ones a need for the Word of God. Ask him to lead each person

on your heart into a study of the Scriptures this week that would transform them and change them. Pray that the Spirit reminds them of Biblical truth when it is needed and when it will keep them from sin. Pray for a mind able and willing to memorize the living Word of God. Ask for a spirit within them that is quick to repent at violations of the Word and is eager to walk in conformity to the will of God as revealed in the Bible. (see Ps. 119, 2Tim. 3:16-17)

**Pray that God would use them for good.** There are so many things in this world that seek to use people for their own ends, simply to discard them on the other end. Pray that God will use them for Good and to affect holiness in our world. Ask God to allow them to serve others, to spread joy and peace, to help someone in need, to give sacrificially and generously. (Gen. 51:20, Ps. 34:14, Lk. 6:35)

**Pray for a freedom from worry and anxiety.** Stress abounds in our modern, western world. People fret and agonize over financial concerns, employment concerns and relational concerns. Ask God to free them from worry and to grant them the peace that passes understanding. Beseech the Lord for the blessing of a life that trusts Him, even in the trials, and knows that the Loving, Sovereign Hand of God is upon them for good and not for harm. (see 1Pt. 5:7, Ps. 94:19)

**Pray for growth in the fruit of the Spirit.** We are told in Scripture that the fruit of a life touched and indwelt by the Spirit of God is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. There isn't a person alive who couldn't benefit from an increasing ability to practice each of these virtues. Ask God to bear the fruit of regeneration in the lives of your loved ones. Reflect on specific areas of life where these virtues would serve others. (see Gal. 5:22-23, 1Cor. 13:4-6)

**Pray for growth in holiness, righteousness and purity.** Our God is a consuming fire. He is Holy and commands us to be holy too. Ask the Lord to increasingly separate the ones you love from everything that ensnares and keeps them from living in holiness, righteousness and purity. Ask him to place a desire within them, as well as empowering them, to flee the sins which so easily entangle. Ask the Lord for eyes to see the way out of each temptation and to make use of the exit door quickly and speedily. (see Lev. 11:44, 19:2, 20:26, Eph. 1:4. 1Pt. 1:15)

All seven of these items are evangelistic and discipleship oriented. Each of them can be prayed for our loved ones who are not walking with Christ by asking God to work in them the initial work of Grace, which saves. But these prayers are also discipleship oriented and can be prayed for those who have been walking with the Lord for years or decades, for we each need an increase in our conformity to the life of Christ. May these prayers, informed by the Scriptures, encourage your own soul and transform the lives of those for whom you pray.

## The Bible as a letter

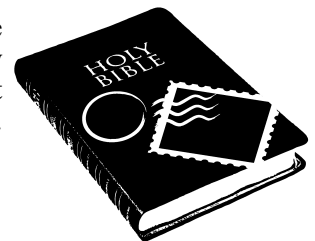
Søren Kierkegaard, a brilliant 19th-century philosopher, said this about the Bible: "The Bible should be read as a letter from God with our personal address on it."

## JOIN HOPE IN CHRIST CHURCH AS WE RESPOND TO THE FIRE DISASTER IN OKANAGAN COUNTY

**WASHINGTON – Okanogan County DISASTER:** *Wildfires-Major Disaster Declaration declared on August, 2014 Impacted the Cities of: Pateros, Carlton, Brewster, Twisp.*

**WORK:** Working with Carlton Complex Fire Recover LTRO. The greatest need right now is for fences to be rebuilt so livestock can be managed (860 MILES of fencing) and also a lot of ash/trash/metal debris removal. In June 2015 they will start reconstruction.

**ACCOMMODATIONS/MEALS:** There are 5-6 churches that are available to provide accommodations. The volunteer coordinator will assign work projects and housing per group depending on groups' ages and size, as well as, skill-level. Depending on the facility; bunk beds and cots are available (you may want to or bring a single air mattress for comfort). Showers, restrooms and a kitchen is available for the groups to prepare their own meals. Grocery store is nearby.

**COST:** Range may vary from NO Charge to \$25.00 per person/per night.

**WHAT TO BRING:** Volunteers must bring their own bedding/sleeping bags, towels & toiletries, pillows.

**AGE REQUIREMENT:** Generally high school and up are welcome; youth under the age of 14 must be accompanied by an adult.

Northwest Hispanic Ministry Report for January 2016 by Joe Strong  
(NWHM, 701 Blackburn Rd. Mount Vernon, WA 98273)

One of the highlights of my work is visiting families in our churches. I try to make it into the homes of each family every 6 months. I don't have an agenda other than to see how life is going. I spend about 2 hours drinking coffee, talking, listening and praying with each household. Last Saturday, I was in the home of Victor and Francisca. They have been attending our Amor Viviente Church regularly for about 6 months. Their children have been coming to our church via our church van for over 8 years. These children are some of the best behave kids I know. Miguel, the oldest, is 18 and about to graduate from high school and enter the National Guard. Miguel also collects the offering in our church and helps count the money. "It was the love that you showed our children that initially brought us to the church. Then we realized that you really teach the Bible also." As I stood to pray for the family, Victor called all the kids who were outside in and we held hands and prayed in a circle. God is doing amazing work in our Amor Viviente Church. Nearly every week our church is full.

I cannot count the amount of times that I encounter prisoners in the Whatcom County Jail, who have no desire to speak with a chaplain, but they talk with me. I work on the premise that everybody has a huge hole in their heart and are seeking Jesus even though they don't know it. Recently, I encountered Mickey a burly, bearded, 42 year old, drug addict, with white supremacist tattoos. Mickey told me that when he was younger, he belonged to the movement. I told him about the Christian based Bridges of Hope transitional house we have in Lynden. He took an application and told me that he would fill it out. A couple of days later, Mickey called from the jail and told me he was out. We made an agreement for him to call me the next day for an interview. He never did. People like Mickey are so fragile that it is practically impossible to keep them clean even for 24 hours. I still pray for Mickey. I hurt for people like Mickey.

Herman was baptized in our Amor Viviente Church about 4 years ago along with his daughter. I had fished Herman out of jail. Not long after his baptism, he quit going to church. I let him go after visiting him several times. Monday, there he was waiting for me in the jail. I didn't want to shame him. I told him "let's start again." He agreed. He took a Bible and a Daily Bread. Pray for Herman.
